FROM OUR FOUNDER



Dear Friends,

We don't often stop to think about it in the course of daily life, but as I reflect on 2025, I'm reminded of a simple truth: *the choices we make today are an investment in our future.* In many ways, this work is not unlike growing a garden or planting trees.

The Parklands, since its inception, has planted more than 80,000 trees. Most of them start out in a nursery pot as a small sapling, standing only five to six feet tall. Once established, a tree might grow one or two feet per year. In its first year, maybe it will be food and home to a few insects. By its fifth year, perhaps a songbird will see its canopy finally fit to build a nest. When the tree turns ten, it may be tall enough to shade a family enjoying a picnic underneath. Finally, as it reaches maturity around year twenty, standing fifty feet tall, with a canopy just as wide, it starts producing acorns, food for animals and support for thousands of different species, from the top of its leaves to the bottom of its roots. When we plant trees, we do not plant them for today; we plant them for the future.

If we scale this from one tree to the over 4,000 acres that make up The Parklands, the question becomes "how can we shape our landscapes in the present to support thriving spaces in the generations to come?" This question is being answered not just in the field, but also within our organization. Shaping the landscape of the people who preserve and protect The Parklands is just as important.

I have seen time and time again how the intentional design behind The Parklands has paid off. In 2011, we opened our first amenity, The Marshall Playground and Sprayground, in Beckley Creek Park. Right beside it sits the Egg Lawn, a 22-acre grassy field with a ring of

trees outlining it, deliberately left open and inviting for a wide variety of activities. Over the years, I have seen how the community orients itself around this space, as well as countless others throughout the parks, gathering here in times of joy, sorrow, and everything in between.

As I look back on the last year, I see the choices we have made along the way succeeding in these beloved places. I also see it taking shape in areas just starting to take form, and in others still untouched, waiting for their full potential to be realized. We could not have done it without you. The choice to support a park system made possible entirely through generosity and a shared vision, is truly remarkable. I am grateful every day for the choices we have made, and continue to make, together for our future.

RECORD PARTICIPATION FOR EDUCATION

Exploring the outdoors is becoming second nature for more kids in Louisville, thanks to visitor and donor support. This was another record year for The Parklands Outdoor Classroom, with our **S.E.E.D. Program** (Stewardship, Education, Exploration, and Discovery) continuing to grow in scope and impact.

This program provides a pathway for students at Title I schools and equivalent programs to experience the parks by removing the financial barriers of field trip costs, including transportation. In 2025 alone, we awarded **more than 14,000 scholarships** to underserved students, more than any year before.

In addition to field trips and outreach programs, our Education Team also hosted dozens of engaging learning opportunities for our whole community, including weekly Wednesday Wonders sessions, 3 Junior Explorer events, 20 guided hikes through The Parklands Walking Club, seasonal StoryWalk® reading adventures, and a handful of larger celebrations like Friday at Floyds and Earth Day Fest.

In total, The Parklands Outdoor Classroom provided **26,600+ educational experiences** in 2025.

Our hope is that everyone who engages with our programs walks away with a deeper connection to the natural world. Growing participation, and the smiles we see from learners of all ages, tell us we are achieving that goal.

CULTIVATING CONFIDENCE AND CURIOSITY AT CAMP

Adventure Day Camps at The Parklands set kids' curiosity in motion. In 2025, we had more than 500 registrations across spring, summer, and fall break camps, including more than 100 that were fully funded through scholarships.

Each season offered new opportunities to experience the parks through activities like fishing, kayaking, hiking, creek exploration, and hands-on discovery. Across all camp sessions, outdoor adventure was thoughtfully paired with indoor learning experiences that helped campers deepen their understanding of the environment, develop new skills, and build a lifelong love for the outdoors.

CONNECTING OUR COMMUNITY WITH NATURE

From the very beginning, our vision has been to extend the legacy of landscape architect Frederick Law Olmsted, who believed parks were essential to urban life.

We built The Parklands along Louisville's urban corridor so that it can provide a haven for people as the city continues to grow. Throughout the park, pathways and green spaces were designed to give people of all ages, abilities, and interests opportunities to create their own experiences in nature.

In 2025, we continued to strengthen both access and connection between visitors and the landscape by improving bridges, trails, and amenities, while enhancing programming and stewardship to ensure the park remains welcoming, well-maintained, and widely used by visitors year-round.

By strengthening the physical and emotional connections between people and the landscape, while maintaining our high operational standards, we can ensure that The Parklands continues to be a place that shapes our city through both its location and its influence on the community.

NO DEFERRED MAINTENANCE

Since The Parklands was founded, we've been committed to our guiding principle of “no deferred maintenance.” This means we address issues as they arise and take proactive steps to prevent future problems. Our enduring goal is to keep the parks safe, clean, fun, and beautiful for all visitors—365 days a year, every year.

One of our largest maintenance efforts in 2025 focused on critical infrastructure improvements in our southern parks, including the geographically complex Limestone Gorge area. This work involved proactive repairs and repainting of two pedestrian bridges, as well as trail repairs along the Louisville Loop, to improve long-term durability and visitor experience. The project was carefully planned in phases to minimize disruption, with clear communication provided to visitors throughout construction, and was completed in approximately two weeks.

By performing maintenance in a timely manner and to a world-class standard, we help ensure The Parklands remains a beloved destination for visitors today and well into tomorrow.

GROWING OUR CANOPY & IMPACT

Every year we source hundreds of new trees to increase biodiversity and support our ongoing conservation efforts. We planted a total **360 trees** throughout the parks in 2025.

We also continued work that began in late 2024 to stabilize stream banks along The Strand with trees and plants native to our riparian habitat. We installed sycamores, cottonwoods, willows, hackberries, and maples, all of which have complex root systems that help anchor soil in place and reduce erosion. Beyond this ecological benefit, these trees are beautiful to behold, with distinctive bark patterns and abundant leaves.

Through careful management and stewardship, we expect these young trees will mature into valuable assets for our forests, with roots systems that are every bit as remarkable as the canopies that will one day tower above them.



CARING FOR A DYNAMIC LIVING LANDSCAPE

Managing over 4,000 acres of open meadows, riparian and upland forest, and former agricultural fields requires a thoughtful approach. It's an intricate process that balances art with science, intentional curation with restoration, established practices with experimentation, and planning with plain hard work.

In 2025, as in previous years, our Horticulture and Natural Areas Team focused on bringing out the beauty of trees, shrubs, and other living layers while helping them thrive. We also conducted targeted vegetation management to enhance views along trails and make natural-surface paths easier to navigate.

We strategically removed invasive species and controlled vegetation throughout our primary trail system, including paths leading to our namesake Floyds Fork. Much of this effort was concentrated around the “leaping bridges” and other iconic places to improve access and beauty throughout the parks.

By clearing and controlling overgrown flora, we were better able to reveal some of the park's special places and create more opportunities for visitors to experience them. This work also helps keep visitors safe when hiking or cycling, as dense vegetation can interfere with sightlines, particularly in areas with winding curves.

Hundreds of community leaders, entrepreneurs, and park lovers came together to support our growing science-based education program, raising a net sum of over \$200,000.

A highlight of the day was welcoming students from Iroquois High School and Crossroads Elementary, two of our S.E.E.D. partner schools, whose energy and excitement brought the impact of outdoor learning to life.

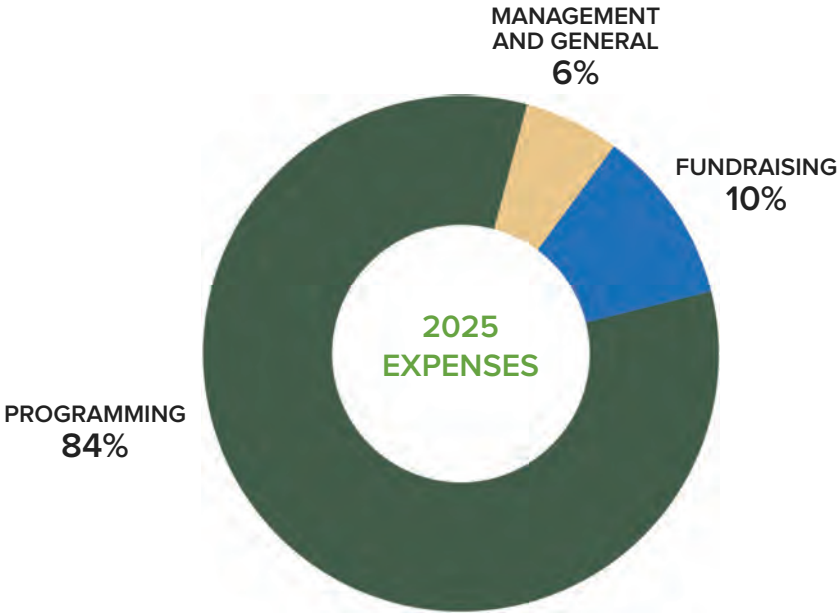
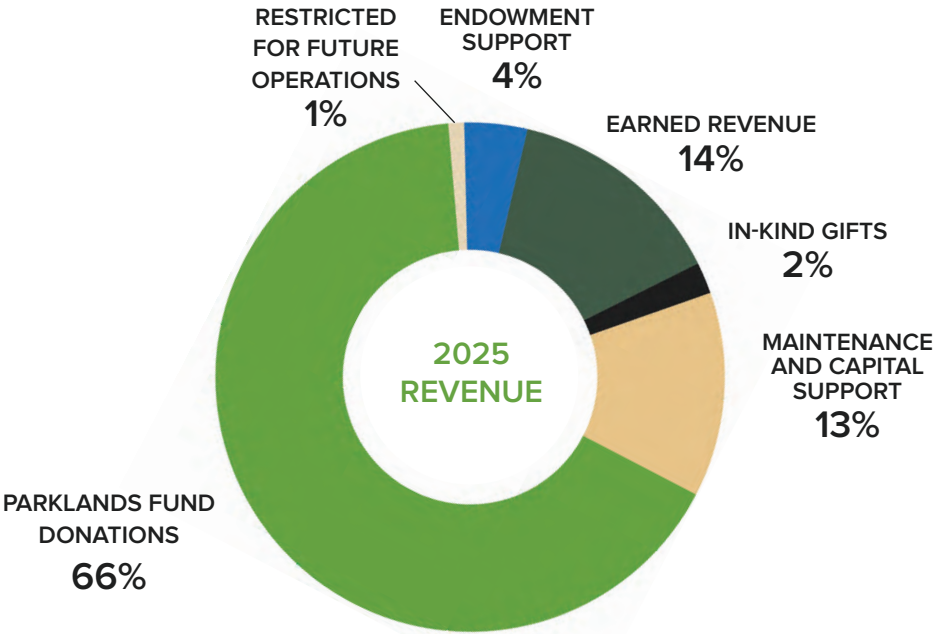

Creating exceptional park experiences requires both daily stewardship and long-term planning. As The Parklands looks ahead, we remain committed to ensuring community access by investing in the programs and infrastructure that will serve our visitors for generations.

In the coming years, we will continue expanding our ever-growing S.E.E.D. Program, with a goal of providing more than 20,000 educational experiences annually through field trips and in-school instruction. Our aim is that approximately 15,000 of these experiences will be made possible through scholarships, ensuring that financial barriers do not prevent students from connecting with the outdoors.

At the same time, we will continue enhancing the parks for all visitors to enjoy through year-round maintenance and a steadfast commitment to our operational guiding principles: keeping The Parklands safe, clean, fun, and beautiful 365 days a year, from dawn to dusk, with no entry fee. This includes continued investment in staff training, adherence to The Parklands Master Plan, and the development of comprehensive management and capital maintenance plans to guide thoughtful growth and responsible stewardship.

Together, these efforts will help preserve the natural beauty, recreational opportunities, and exceptional visitor experiences that make The Parklands a treasured resource.

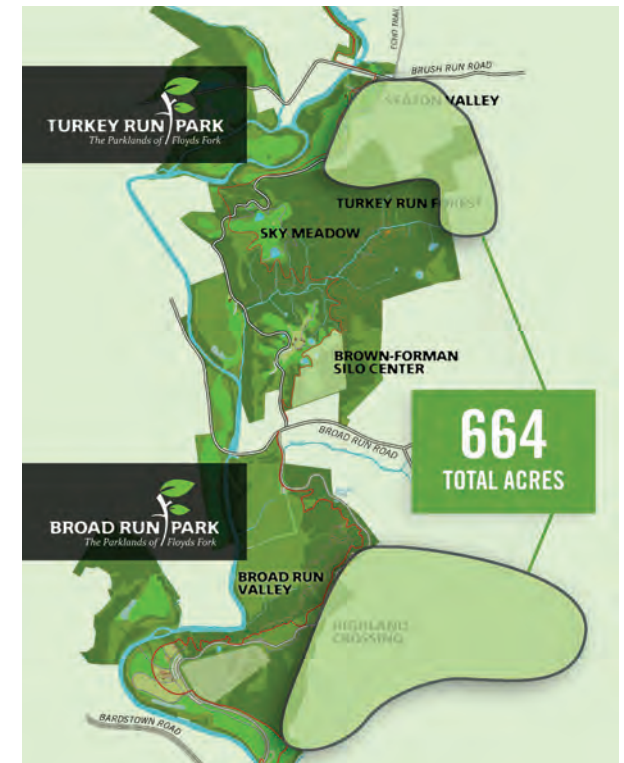
...WHILE WE CONTINUE TO DEVELOP THE NEXT GENERATION OF PARK LANDSCAPES

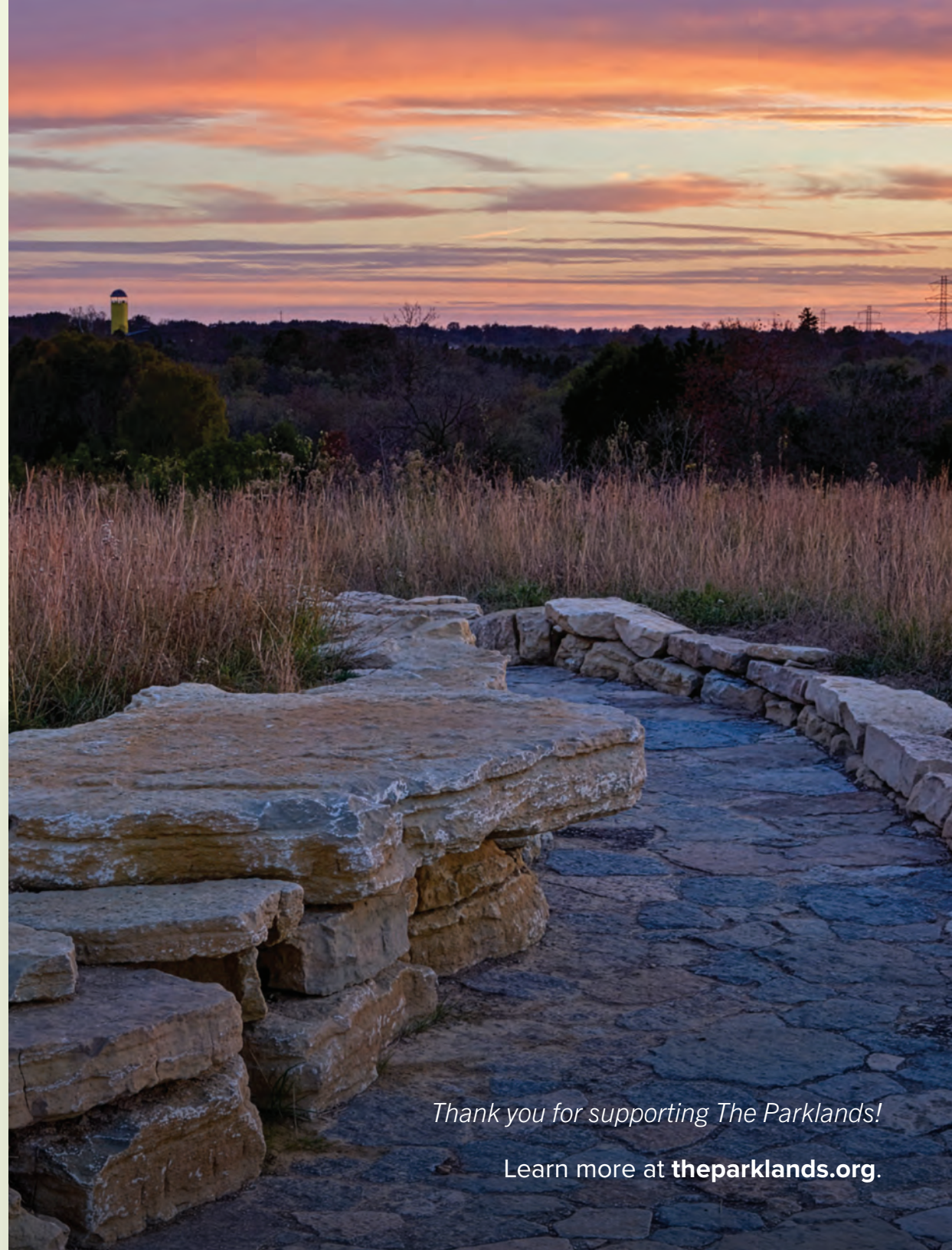
